Club Master's Corner

Responding to a one level overcall

Many club players have little agreed upon distinction between responding to partner's overcall and her opening bid. other than to be cautious. I have heard many opponents state "I was just an overcall" as if their 1 heart overcall somehow limited their point count to 9 to 12 HCP. A One level overcall can have anywhere from 8 or 9 to 16 HCP, quite different from a 1 level opener which can be anywhere from 12 to 20 HCP. The responses must therefore be quite different, as well as the overcaller's subsequent bids. If the responder (opener's partner) bids then all bids by advancer (overcaller's partner) are strictly competitive, and both overcaller and advancer must base all bids on presumed opponents stated strength and distribution

When responder passes, advancer could employ a version of the Drury convention by bidding 2 clubs. This requires overcaller to rebid their suit with a sub-opener, and cue bid any Ace or King with a full opener. This approach suffers from further

competitive bids by the opposition since your side has not significantly defined your resources.

A much better approach has been championed by Eddie Kantar. Many good players employ his methods.

The key difference is the ability for advancer to immediately define game interest versus competitive bids. With 11 HCP or more, advancer starts with a cue bid of opener's suit. This normally will show support or tolerance of overcaller's suit. All other bids are non forcing.

You hold not Vul vs Vul:

♦98 ♥K 9 7 3 ♦9 8 2 **♣**7 6 3 2

Your LHO opens 1♦ partner overcalls 1♥ (maximum 15, or a bad 16 HCP), and RHO passes. LHO obviously has a very good hand and all of you would bid a pre-emptive 3♥.

After partner overcalls your LHO, all raises are pre-emptive. Same bidding, but you now hold:

★KQ1085 **♥**5 **♦**A76 **♣**8732

Now you bid 1. This is constructive and non forcing, denies support for partner, shows a decent suit and a maximum of 10 HCP. With a full opener, a good suit or support for you, partner may bid again knowing you may pass.

Mea Culpa

I almost never play bridge Friday night in Comox, but Tom Thomson, for whom I have considerable respect as a player, called me some weeks ago for a game and I was very pleased to accept. The first two rounds I felt we scored very well and did average or above for the next three rounds, a boost in confidence. So, I felt, we are communicating well, both in bidding, and defense. We are in tune!

Then in round seven came board 18.

I was North and Held:

43 ♥9 6 4 **♦**10 9 8 3 **♣**A Q 8 6 3

East passed, and I routinely bid 2. West passed, and I routinely bid 2. East passed, and I now bid 3. West passed, and I now bid 3. which I thought a normal second bid. The opposition being out of it, Tom bid 3. completing the description of his hand. So now what do I do? How much are we in tune now? I could bid 4. to show support, but perhaps the optimum contract would be 3NT. How do I steer the bidding to this possible makeable game? We have bid three suits

naturally, How will Tom take my 3♥ bid? I tossed this around in my head, and thought he must take this as an invitation to bid 3NT if he held a heart stopper. Tom now bid 4NT. 5♣ by me showed one control, and we ended in 6NT by Tom.

The full deal:

•3 ▼9 6 4 •10 9 8 3 •A Q 8 6 3

So they take the first 5 heart tricks, and we are down 4, for a zero.

Mea Culpa!

The club results:

In 8 pairs, three were in spades, 1 making 6, two five. Two were in 5ϕ making, others defending.

Mea Culpa

I intended my 3 as an invitation to 3NT if Tom had a heart stopper. Tom took me as showing a heart stopper allowing him to bid 3NT, keeping the strong hand hidden, and he receiving the opening lead.

Without some discussion about the meaning of bidding sequences, one should take the most straight forward of bidding sequences as the agreed norm. I should have simply bid 4+ to complete my shape. 5+ will surely make, perhaps a poor board if 3NT is a superior contract, but how about 6+? 5+ would have been an average board, not bad for an occasional partnership.

Tom suggested my first bid could have been 3. describing a 5 card suit with 2 of the top 3 honors. This would frequently be golden if he held three to the King in No trump, but in this instance while working better than our bidding sequence, would have made it impossible to find the diamond fit.

As for the three pairs that ended up in 4. I would like to invite them to a weekend of bridge and beer, playing for penny a point. They got lucky this time, but luck is fickle!

With 11 or more HCP, you, as advancer start with a cue bid. Partner (overcaller) could have as much as 16 HCP, and game may be available. You need to explore game possibilities. Partner with a sub-opener will bid two of their suit. With a full opener partner should cue bid any Ace or King.

In order to cue bid, advancer needs at least tolerance for overcaller's suit. Your LHO opens 1, and partner overcalls 1. You hold:

≜KJ ♥AQ1096 ♦A5 **♣**8652

You are too strong to just bid 2♥, you could do this with:

★3 ♥A Q J 7 3 2 ◆7 3 **★**J 7 3

Constructive, non forcing.

With the first hand, you would cue bid. If partner just rebids spades, you can pass. If partner cue bids clubs, you can bid 4.

If instead you hold:

43 ♥A Q J 7 3 2 ♦A Q 3 **4**7 3 2

Eddie suggests you jump to 3 \checkmark , invitational to game with no support for partner. This is a suit that can stand up to a singleton support. With a weaker suit, downgrade your points and make a constructive non forcing response.

Handling Psych's

This article is aimed at educating and advising our less experienced players how to handle the situation when an "A" player has psyched against them. While recognizing that psyches are a part of the game and are NOT illegal. The ACBL does have a policy in place prohibiting "unsportsmanlike" psyches which includes "A" players who take undue advantage of weaker players. However the only way the ACBL can address this issue is by - Can you quess? - YES as per usual YOU must call the Director to the table right away to report it. Firstly though you have to learn how to identify a psyche. Usually when a player has psyched they will consequently pass any further bids made by their partner including artificial and game forcing bids. The moment you Identify this is the time to call the Director to the table. At a recent tournament a good "C" player was a victim of 2 psyches. 2 boards in a row by 2 very experienced "A" players during a team game match. It was a humiliating experience for that player. What concerns me are those players who may not even realize they have been "HAD". It does behoove our "A" players to display good sportsmanship ALWAYS. Remember We were all beginners once, back in the day!!!. ALL of our members want to Enjoy, Learn and Gain experience in a positive environment. PLEASE encourage our less experienced players by NOT psyching against them to take undue advantage. It is no fun at all for them!

Thanking you all, and please remember to CALL THE DIRECTOR.

Club Master's Corner

Without support Eddie suggests considering a No Trump response. 1NT shows 9-11 HCP taking into account partner may have a sub-opener.

♦6 ♥A J 8 6 **♦**K 9 4 3 **♣**Q 10 5 4

Bid 1NT

483 ♥ A J 8 ♦ A K 5 4 **4** J 9 8 4

Bid 2NT - range 12-14 HCP

He suggests that with a conventional 1NT opener, 15-17, jump to 3NT. If partner can overcall and you have about 16HCP, what are the odds partner does not have a stopper?

Eddie does not explain how to handle a hand with poor support, a 5 card suit, unsuitable for notrump but with which you wish to be in game should partner have a full opener. This can be done by starting with a cue bid, planning to bid your suit next. You should be prepared for partner's sub-opener, by having at least 2 card support, be willing if partner shows a partial stopper to play 2NT, or have a second suit to offer partner.



Partner will assume you have support, and return to his suit with a sub-opener. When you now bid your suit, this will be a one round force. Partner can raise with 3 (or a good 2) card support, show a lower ranking 4 card suit, rebid his 6 (or if desperate 5) card suit, or bid 2NT with at least partial stopper.

If partner has a full opener she will make any other bid such as a direct raise of your suit, notrump, or another suit to show 'something' in that suit. Your decision as overcaller's partner will naturally depend on the strength you require for an overcall. 8 HCP is the accepted minimum. Some players expect 10 HCP, as this allows for a clearer evaluation of safe part score or game opportunities.

You and your partner need to get together with a bottle of wine and sort out these responses.
